Biblical Idea: The <u>suffering</u> of the Servant caught Jesus' disciples off guard until the <u>resurrection</u> regathering for mission.

Introduction Image: Washington Delaware (12/25-26/1776)

Need: Watchful fellowship Subject: The Servant's suffering Purpose: To accept the invitation

Structure the Text:

- The eschatological weight of the <u>moment</u> uncovered the need of the disciples (14:27–31; cf. Zech. 13:7).
 - Jesus gave a prophetic warning of exilic and eschatological character following the supper.
 - The disciples would allow themselves to fall away from Jesus (permissive passive, not terminal).
 - Jesus connected their fall to "the day" in Zechariah 13 (Illustrative/recapitulating? See Marcus 971–73, France 575–76).
 - Peter represented emphatic loyalty of the disciples (14:29; cf. 8:29–33; 9:5–6; 10:28; 11:21).
- The Servant began to <u>carry</u> the weight of his suffering with three episodes of invitation to watchful fellowship (14:32– 42; cf. Ps. 42:5, 11; 43:5).
 - Episode one revealed the great <u>burden</u> of the Servant (vv. 32–38).
 - Episode two explained the <u>burden</u> of the disciples (39–40).
 - Episode three contrasted the <u>destiny</u> of the Servant and the <u>drowsiness</u> of the disciples (40–41).

Purpose Bridge: To fellowship in God's great **burden** (hour, cup)—the mission and glory of His Son.

Theological Tension:

The natures of the spirit and the flesh **oppose** one another in suffering's temptation. (Marcus, 979, 987–88, France, 587)

Theological Truth:

Disciples require the Spirit of Christ for watchful fellowship in God's great burden.

Appalachia: The chasm between our weakness and willingness confronts our Appalachian value of self-reliance.

Today's Message: Don't Sleep on Suffering's Significance.

Make It Personal: 5 Watchful Ways

- Replace (self)<u>prevention</u> and (self)relief with fellowship (14:27–31).
- Drowsy fleshiness requires the <u>generous</u> willingness of the Holy Spirit (14:38; cf. Rom. 8:26–29).
- Be mindful of <u>existing</u> burdens when committing to share another's burden in prayer (14:32–40).
- Rejoice in the suffering Servant's <u>sufficiency</u> (14:41–42).
- Hope in the <u>Shepherd's</u> resurrection regathering (14:27–28).
